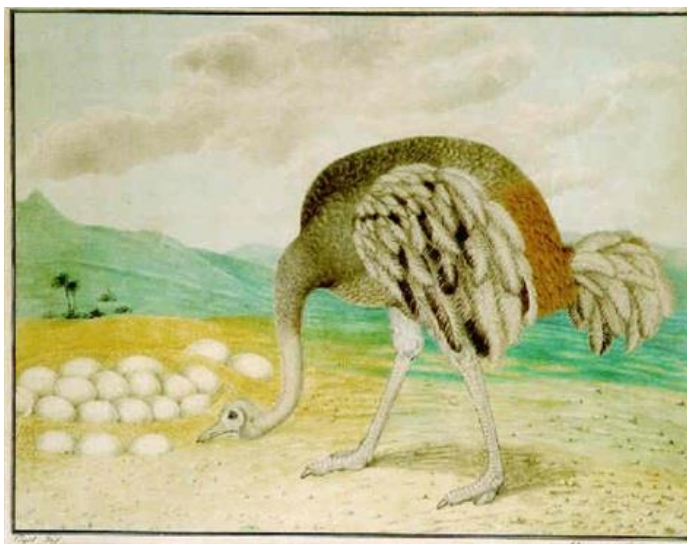

<p>Realist – A branch of visual art that is based on what is present and is 'realistic'.</p> <p>Shade – Mixing colours with black, which increases darkness.</p> <p>Tone- This refers to the relative lightness or darkness of a colour.</p> <p>Installation- Installation artworks occupy an entire room or gallery space that the spectator has to walk through in order to engage fully with the work of art.</p> <p>Contemporary- a term used to refer to art of the present day and of the relatively recent past.</p>	<p>Aloys Zoltl was born in Freisdatd, Austria, 1803.</p> <p>Zoltl was a skilled 'realist' painter.</p> <p>Zoltl was used by explorers to depict in painting the animals they have seen during their travels.</p> <p>Due to the historical era (no cameras), Zoltl only had written descriptions to paint from.</p> <p>Zoltl used a broad colour range. 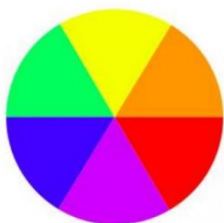

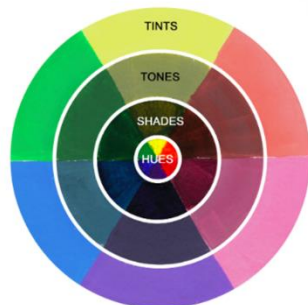

Colour Theory



Secondary Colors



Secondary Colours: The secondary colours are green, orange and purple. These are created by mixing primary colours (Red, blue, yellow) together.

Tone: In art, tone refers to the areas of lightness and darkness on an object or colour. How we view tones depends on the surface of the object. Colour tone is created by adding different amounts of white or light colours for light tones.

Shade: Add only black to a hue and you get a shade — which tends to be darker and often more intense than the original colour. Gradually adding different amounts of black, grey or dark colours for darker shades.

Tint: A tint is the opposite of shade- This makes the colour lighter. Gradually adding white to a colour will for you lighter tints.

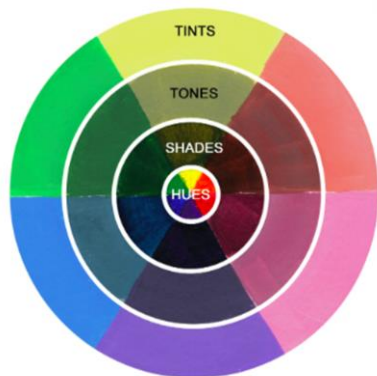

Colour Theory



Pastel Colours: A **pastel colour** is any **colour** that has just enough white mixed into it to look pale and soft while maintaining its colourful personality.

Tone: In art, tone refers to the areas of lightness and darkness on an object or colour. How we view tones depends on the surface of the object. Colour tone is created by adding different amounts of white or light colours for light tones.

Shade: Add only black to a hue and you get a shade — which tends to be darker and often more intense than the original colour. Gradually adding different amounts of black, grey or dark colours for darker shades.

Yumi Okita

Okita is an American textile artists who creates insects (moths and butterflies) using textiles. Okita's creations, replete with fur, eyes, legs, antennae, and finely-embroidered wing patterns, strike a fine balance between artistry and realism. There's a wonderful tension between the beauty of her work and the unsettling creepy-crawly furriness of a giant bug – her creations can reach up to almost a foot in width.
