Year 5/6 'Mini Athletics Competition'

Last week the children in Years Five and Six took part in a mini athletics competition on the school field. This was a new event in the school calendar and the aim was for the older children in these year groups to experience a competitive sporting event more in line with Orton Sports (A track and field event against other primary schools). All the children were split into four equally balanced teams and took part in trials. Those that performed best were selected for the events. We made it clear to the children that they would not all be selected for these events and if disappointed it was a good opportunity for them to think about the learning toolkit, practise and try hard at the next opportunity.

We were really pleased with how the morning went and we plan to do the same next year. We have also thought hard about how it could be improved and have already discussed possible changes to the trials and the event itself.

*** A higher percentage of parents has said 'Don't Know' for 'This school responds well to any concern I raise.' If you remove these, on the assumption that these parents have not had a concern to raise, 96% of parents chose a positive statement.

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As you can see, these are a great set of results. When 'Don't Knows' are removed from the bullying question, all of the 21 questions score over 90% and 17 of them score over 95%. I believe that this would be considered a very positive outcome in any questionnaire.

Most of the comments that were made were lovely and heart-warming, but it would be untrue to say that all of the comments were positive. There were a handful of negative comments from approximately five parents. I wouldn't ever want to be accused of only trumpeting the school's success and want all parents to know that we read and consider their comments. Although the questionnaire included this wonderful comment;

'OWPS is amazing - period. My daughter loves it and everything about it. She's had 5 years there now and adored each and every one of her teachers, and TA's. Platform One has been every bit as good. I cannot wait for Year 5 and the stories of her learning that she will talk about endlessly after school. Keep up the awesome work.'

We also received this comment:

Feel the school is more concerned with its reputation rather than the welfare of the students. Concerns raised were not addressed and rather excuses made and then swept under the carpet. In addition, if the school cannot fund processes set out in its anti-bullying policy then the policy should be re written. I would also like to add the school meals appear smaller this year than last year.

The first comment fits in with what we believe we are about as a school, whereas the second describes a school we do not recognise. On three occasions, I have approached the parent who wrote the second comment and invited them in to talk about why they feel the way they do, but these invites have been declined.

I am conscious that very few parents ever make an appointment to see Mr Marks or me during the year to let us know if they are unhappy with an element of the school's work. We will always try to resolve any parental concerns the best we can, even if it is not always possible to give every parent what he or she wants.

I am also mindful that we have seen a slight decrease in most of the questions. Common sense tells me that a fluctuation of 1-2% is not significant, but if you knew me well, as my staff do, you would know that I will stew on the small minority of negative responses before looking at the bigger picture. I need to take a bit of time to digest how we get things so right for so many parents, and yet a few parents are unhappy with what we offer.

Before I decide what to do, I want to reiterate what I have said repeatedly – you can always make an appointment to see your child's teacher, a Team Leader, Mr Marks or me. Do not wait until a questionnaire comes out to let us know that you are unhappy. Equally, you can always let us know when you are pleased! 😊
